CARL ROGERS AND HUMANISTIC EDUCATION

Starting in the 1950s, psychologists, including Rogers, responded to this view of human behavior with the humanistic approach to psychology, which offered a less pessimistic perspective. Humanists championed the idea that people are motivated by higher-order needs.

Carl Rogers: Founder of the Humanistic Approach to Psychology

Carl Rogers has been called the "Father of Humanistic

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Psychology" and devoted much of his efforts toward applying the results of his psychological research to person-centered teaching where empathy, caring about students, and genuineness on the part of the learning facilitator were found to be the key traits of the most effective teachers.

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Humanistic psychologists such as Carl Rogers and Abraham Maslow advanced the importance of enhancing children's self-esteem during the early years. "All About Me" curriculum units, for example, became very popular in early childhood education during the 1970s in part due to the impact of humanistic ideas.

Carl Rogers (1902-1987) was a humanisticpsychologist who

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agreed with the main assumptions of Abraham Maslow. However, Rogers (1959) added that for a person to "grow", they need an environment that provides them with genuineness (openness and self-disclosure), acceptance (being seen with unconditional positive regard), and empathy (being listened to and understood).
